

The British Academy South Asia Area Studies Conference

Space & Spatiality in South Asia

Dates: 7-8 February 2013

Location: The British Academy, 10-11 Carlton House Terrace, London, SW1Y 5AH

The 'spatial turn' is now well established across the academic disciplines, with historians, anthropologists, political scientists and historical geographers exploring how concepts of space and scale - and their interconnections - might inform our understanding of a range of cultural and social formations.

This conference will showcase South Asian studies scholarship in this cutting edge research area, and help us to think about what constitutes "South Asian Studies" as a field of enquiry.

We will explore the significance of the 'spatial turn' for South Asian studies; work through, across and potentially beyond academic disciplines as well as geographical borders. We will ask: what can a focus on space and spatiality illuminate *in* the South Asian context? What does it reveal *about* South Asia as a bounded, geographical unit? How does it help us to think about the *value* of South Asian studies?

Participants will speak on concepts of space and spatiality; borders and borderlands; landscapes, cities and islands; religious, domestic and public space; migration and diaspora; and spatial cultures of performance and identity formation.

This event forms part of a multidisciplinary British Academy initiative to interrogate the meaning and significance of South Asian studies in the UK. The series opened with a roundtable discussion in November 2012. Further events will include a workshop focusing on the study of South Asian languages in the UK (May 2013). The results of a British Academy-commissioned study on UK A-level student motivations for studying South Asian languages will be announced at the workshop.
