



Richard **Hewlings** of English Heritage describes how, influenced by his Grand Tours of Italy, Burlington worked with his architect Colen Campbell and the painter William Kent to make Burlington House, both externally and internally, a manifesto for a new British style.

The Arrival of the Royal Academy: Smirke and Norman Shaw

Friday 6 November
The Royal Academy moved to
Burlington's town palace on

Piccadilly in 1867 as part of the government's ambition for a powerhouse of arts and sciences in the West End. Peter Schmitt, Surveyor to the Fabric for the past fifteen years, discusses how Sydney Smirke RA satisfied the institution's needs by colonising the rear garden with the finest suite of galleries in London and inserted in the undercroft the Royal Academy Schools. Such was the popularity of this development that within ten years Richard Norman Shaw RA doubled the Schools' studios and built an extension to the Main Galleries with a 'Refreshment Room' below reached by a sweeping secondary staircase.




