





# Creating a new prosperity: Fresh approaches to ecosystem services and human well-being

## Royal Geographical Society, London Friday, September 4<sup>th</sup>, 2009

#### An invitation

Recent years have witnessed sustained interest in the idea of 'ecosystem services' and 'ecosystem based approaches' to natural resource management. This one day symposium brings together leading scientists and policy makers to capture current thinking on these concepts and take a 'forward look' at their place in emerging research and policy agendas.

The event is being led by 'Fresh', one of seven ESRC/NERC funded transdisciplinary seminar series developing new understandings of the links between ecosystem services and human well-being in different geographical, thematic and policy contexts.

The event will present a critical and reflective view of the key conclusions of these recent programmes and consider their findings in the context of wider initiatives including the "Living with Environmental Change" (LWEC) and "Ecosystem Services for Poverty Alleviation" (ESPA) programmes, the forthcoming Millennium Ecosystem Assessment for England, as well as drawing comparisons and lessons from recent assessment initiatives conducted at the pan-European and international level.

Attendance at the event is welcomed for all researchers and practitioners wishing to better understand the challenges of managing ecosystem services for a new era of environmental and social prosperity.
