Description: The module introduces the basic structure of the language through topics related to social and everyday life in the countries where the target language is spoken. Students will acquire the four skills of listening, speaking, reading and writing together with basic grammatical structures which will enable them to manipulate the language.

Frequency of class: Three hours of class contact and at least three hours self-study a week, some of which may be in the Self Access Centre, on Moodle or preparation for class sessions and assessment.

Methodology: Teaching is communicative with regular opportunities for pair and group-work. Emphasis is placed on all 4 language skills, making use of language labs and materials in the Self Access Centre.

Teaching and learning is supported by:

- Moodle and other e-learning materials (see module information sheet for individual languages). It is essential to access Moodle regularly for updates and announcements.
- The Language Clinic: weekly drop-in sessions for individual **support** and **feedback**.
- The Self Access Centre: Room C66 in the Trent Building.
 This term (11/01-18/03)the Self Access Centre will be open from Monday to Thursday, from 10.00-3.00pm. It is closed on Fridays and at the weekend.

Dictionaries are not allowed during any part of the examination except that those whose first language is not English may use a dictionary to translate between that language and English provided that neither language is the subject of the examination. No electronic devices capable of storing and retrieving text may be used.

The pass mark for this module is 40%.
