Power: 'web' or 'net' (Mills 2003)
Forms of social practice
Fluidity



Face and advice-giving

- Defining face
 Giving/receiving advice: facethreatening: competency and autonomy are threatened (Locher and Hoffman 2006)
 Advice: beyond individual: for
- any visitor to the site



Adolescent health care

- Primary care: GPs and adolescents: Communication barriers exist
 - Fear of confidentiality breaches
 - Marginalisation
 - embarrassment

Methodology

- •Over 60,000 email texts from adolescents
- Corpus approach: 1 million words
- •Quantitative and qualitative methods
- Responses: qualitative analysis

Euphemisms and face saving

•Dr-patient face to face encounters:

Euphemisms used to refer to sexual body parts to save face

 Can hamper effectiveness of medical advice/lead to miscommunication (Stewart 2005; Weijts et al. 1993)

• Current emphasis on 'openess' in Drpatient communication in the NHS (Tayler & Ogden 2005)

Responses: Terms of address

• Use adolescents' self-definition: echoing the identity performed

 Doctors preserve face:
 Anonymity of disembodied identities is maintained and reinforced

•Enables other readers to directly identify with the identity presented



Exchanges

- Negotiation of politeness and power
 - Formality-informality
 - Solidarity-social distance
 - Communication accommodation
 - Use of slang Empathy Echoing/parallelism



Impoliteness

Judgements of appropriateness made by doctors:

Messages judged to be impolite do not appear on the website: use of expletives Intentionally offensive/ threatening, inappropriate address terms



Summary

CMC enables advice to be requested, given and received in an environment where face is saved: disembodied fluid identities

Politeness and power are fluid: Solidarity-building: informality & accommodation Social distance: Authority

Doctors make judgements of appropriateness by not responding/not uploading impolite messages
