# **Getting Started with Participant Observation**

Sam and Lucy started working on the project on the 15<sup>th</sup> September and have completed their training to become home carers. Both Sam and Lucy are researchers, and as part of this role they will be working as home care workers. They will do this part time, over the course of one year. They will be doing everything that comes with the job of a care worker, but they will also be observing the work they do and making notes about the experience of giving and receiving care.

These notes will form the data for the study which will be analysed by the team. This method of collecting data by observing situations first-hand is called participant observation.

### **Progress So Far**

- All of the research team have now been recruited and the study is under way.
- We were granted ethical approval from the Social Care Research Ethics Committee (REC) on the 28<sup>th</sup> September.
- We are working with two home care providers.
- Sam and Lucy have completed the induction and training to become home care workers.
- We have received approval from the Association of Directors of Adult Social Services (ADASS).

### Next Steps . . .

Now that the project is under way, the next steps are for Lucy and Sam to:

- Recruit clients from each home care provider who are willing to help with the research, and
- Start the participant observation while working as home care workers.
