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## Biography:

I completed my undergraduate and MRes degree's at University West of England based at Hartpury College. Both dissertations centred around examining the use of smart-textile technology in the field of horse-rider analysis. After graduating, I completed a one-year placement at the Royal (Dick) School of Veterinary Studies equine hospital in Edinburgh, working as a research assistant and soft tissue surgical technician. Since 2018 I have been based at the University of Nottingham, School of Veterinary Medicine and Science, completing a PhD project on "Investigating the knowledge and use of Quality Improvement (QI) methods in equine veterinary medicine".

### **Research Topic:**

Knowledge and use of quality improvement methods in equine veterinary medicine.

# **Summary of research:**

- Literature review of the development and use of quality improvement methods in both human and veterinary medicine. Using a structured search of published literature, examined the historical development of QI methods in different industries including manufacturing, aviation, education, and healthcare. Examined the historic and current uses of QI methods in human medical care and compared how this relates to QI reported in the veterinary literature.
- Knowledge and understanding of quality improvement methods within UK veterinary
  industry: a cross-sectional survey of professionals working in the industry. Used an online
  survey to investigate and gauge current knowledge and opinion of QI methods from a wide
  variety of UK based veterinary professionals and scrutinised the training and education
  resources available to professionals working in practice.
- The perceptions of quality veterinary care and quality improvement from different professionals within a referral equine hospital. Evaluated what quality care means to professionals working in UK equine veterinary practice and ascertained what QI means and how it is currently applied in an equine referral veterinary practice via interviews/focus groups.
- The impact of a pandemic and ensuing restriction of the delivery of quality care by UK veterinary practices. Used a series of cross sectional sequential online questionnaires to

assess the impact of a global pandemic on quality care in UK veterinary practices and identified novel methods utilised by veterinary practices to maintain high standards of care and service to clients.

Developing consensus for definitions of key veterinary-specific quality improvement terms:
 an eDelphi-study method. Gathered consensus via a Delphi study on appropriate and specific
 definitions related to QI in UK veterinary practice.
