# Community connections

Our Civic Agreement ambition: We will connect the expertise of our innovative student and academic community with initiatives that directly benefit local communities.

## Nottingham Students' Partnership drives students' active citizenship

The Nottingham Students' Partnership is strengthening student engagement in civic and social life. Working across both Student Unions it supports the Student Living Strategy (SLS) to promote active citizenship and build stronger student-community connections.

Now in its third year, the Partnership has built strong relationships with local stakeholders, including MPs, City Councillors, and community groups, ensuring students have a voice in local decision-making. Students have been encouraged to participate in local democracy and consultations through targeted election events. The Partnership has worked with the universities to support political engagement by promoting voter registration to over 10,000 students.

The Partnership continues to strengthen relationships between students and the wider city, ensuring students have the tools, knowledge and confidence to play a meaningful role in the place they call home.

# Shaping Nottingham together: the Student Living Strategy's impact

Students are part of the fabric of Nottingham. They bring talent, culture and new perspectives that add to the city's vibrancy. The Student Living Strategy (SLS) is an awardwinning collaboration between the two universities and Nottingham City Council to build strong relationships between the student body and the city, reflecting the diverse needs of different residents.

The strategy aims to establish Nottingham as a safe, healthy and thriving city where everyone feels welcome to live, work, study and visit. Its priorities are to provide the right balance and quality of student accommodation, promote neighbourliness and a clean, sustainable environment, and foster community cohesion and belonging. By delivering on these priorities, the strategy is creating real improvements:

- Meeting housing needs: Better planning decisions are addressing student accommodation needs and freeing up over 500 additional properties for families over the next three years. Council tax exemptions are decreasing by 8% per year, putting money back into vital public services.
- Civic engagement: Improved admissions processes have helped an additional 23,000 new and returning students easily register for the electoral roll, helping students play an active role in their communities.
- Cleaner, safer streets: Employing a dedicated waste co-ordinator and student Community Engagement Ambassadors to manage cleanliness and support students and residents has promoted respectful behaviour, safety and sustainability. University-funded investments in offcampus patrols and new campus police partnerships have contributed to a 36% decrease in anti-social behaviour.

## Co(1)laboratory: Research with real impact

Co(I)laboratory (or Co(I)lab for short) is a groundbreaking research programme transforming how research is done in Nottingham and Nottinghamshire. Backed by Nottingham Trent University, the University of Nottingham, and the UfN partnership, Co(I)lab brings together researchers, local organisations, and communities to address local challenges.

With £5.1m in funding from Research England and an eight-year mission, Co(I)lab is recruiting local research candidates to drive meaningful, evidencebased change. By making postgraduate research more inclusive and ensuring the community is at the heart of every project, Co(I)lab is shaping a future where research works for everyone.

## **Notts' Voice in** Research: shaping local research priorities

Notts' Voice in Research is a Co(I)laboratory initiative that puts community challenges at the centre of research. Through interactive events and workshops, local residents, community leaders, and professionals contribute their knowledge and insights to help identify pressing regional issues.

Recent participants helped identify 16 priority areas covering topics such as access and inclusion in the local economy, the role of physical community hubs, and access to support services. A full overview of these priorities can be found here: tinyurl.com/ notts-voice

# Education partnership, skills and employment

Our Civic Agreement ambition: We will support disadvantaged communities across Nottingham(shire) to raise educational attainment, collaborating with major employers to develop future skills and ensure opportunities are visible and accessible to our local communities.

## **MAtT** initiative helps keep Nottingham graduates in local jobs

The Maximising Access to Talent (MAtT) initiative is working to keep more university graduates in Nottingham and the broader East Midlands. Currently, around 40% of graduates from Nottingham Trent University and the University of Nottingham are retained in highly skilled employment in the region.



Developed to support the UfN ambition to improve the retention of graduates in the local area, MAtT is a partnership between the careers services of both universities. The initiative has gained strong support from businesses, local government, and Nottingham Partners and has led to several successful projects, including the annual Power of Partnerships conference and the creation of the Nottingham Early Talent Group (NETG). It has also helped grow the Digital Marketing Academy (DMA) and backed a Talent and Innovation UKSPF project.

These collaborative efforts have positively impacted student and graduate retention, supported local business development, and increased community engagement. There is strong commitment to continuing these efforts and expanding initiatives to ensure long-term success and sustainability.

### Science in the Park: bringing science to life for local families

Science in the Park has become a popular Nottingham tradition, making science fun and accessible for thousands of families. Held at Wollaton Hall during British Science Week, this flagship event continues to grow, offering more hands-on exhibits, engaging volunteers, and welcoming record-breaking crowds.

This year, all tickets to the free event were claimed within 48 hours, with over 4,000 visitors exploring cutting-edge research. From brain-scanning wearable tech to forensic fingerprinting, robot-building, and uncovering the origins of George the Gorilla, interactive activities captivated attendees of all ages.

University students played a vital role in the event's success, with 66 volunteers from Nottingham Trent University and the University of Nottingham dedicating over 400 hours to engaging local families. Their enthusiasm brought the event to life—whether dressed as dinosaurs, leading activities, or capturing the day in photos.

Led by scientists and engineers from Nottingham's universities, the event provided a rare opportunity for families to interact with real researchers, ask questions, and dive into hands-on experiments that spark lifelong curiosity.

A true community collaboration, Science in the Park continues to inspire the next generation, fostering a love of discovery and bringing the wonders of science to all.

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### Working together to build inclusive workforces

Nottingham's universities, local authorities, colleges, and healthcare providers are collaborating to improve our collective local employment practices and ensure our workforces reflect the diverse communities we serve.

As some of the area's largest employers—collectively providing over 70,000 jobs—the Universities for Nottingham (UfN) Partnership is committed to increasing equality, diversity, and inclusion (EDI) across workplaces. To support this, an active network of EDI specialists has been established, bringing together expertise from universities, local councils, NHS trusts, and further education institutions.



The network meets regularly to share best practice, resources, and learning to create more inclusive recruitment and career development opportunities. So far, sessions have focused on:

- Neuroinclusive workplaces led by the University of Nottingham
- Supported internships pioneered by West Nottinghamshire College
- Graduate and summer intern programmes developed by Nottinghamshire County Council

Future sessions for the network hope to focus on more about the 'Step into the NHS' initiative led by Sherwood Forest NHS Trust and the Nottingham City Council leadership programme for those with protected characteristics.

This shared commitment is driving change, expanding opportunities, and ensuring workplaces are more inclusive and representative.

# Nottingham's universities join forces to expand educational opportunities

A well-established partnership between Nottingham's two universities is **breaking down barriers to education for young people across the city and county**, earning national recognition for its transformative impact.

Teams from NTU and the University of Nottingham work together to support local schools, helping more students from underrepresented backgrounds access higher education.

Key initiatives include the **Students in Classrooms** scheme, which places university students in local schools as literacy achievement coaches, the **Exploring University Together** family event, and a bespoke outreach programme for primary schools—helping to widen access across Nottinghamshire.

Their collaborative efforts were nationally recognised recently when both universities were jointly shortlisted and commended for a Widening Access Partnership Award at the National Education Opportunities Network (NEON) Awards.

By combining resources and expertise in this way, this partnership not only strengthens Nottingham's educational landscape but also provides university students with meaningful opportunities to support local communities.



# CLIMATE AMBASSADORS

### Climate Ambassadors: Helping education settings lead on climate action

The Climate Ambassadors scheme offers free support to nurseries, schools, and colleges to develop and deliver impactful climate action plans. Funded by the Department for Education (DfE), the initiative connects education settings with expert volunteers and peer networks through regional hubs across England. Universities for Nottingham was selected to host the East Midlands hub.

The programme helps schools act on decarbonisation, resilience, biodiversity, and climate education—aligning with the UK Government's goal for all schools to have a climate action plan by 2025.

Volunteer Climate Ambassadors are recruited from universities, businesses, charities, and public sector organisations and provide expertise to support education settings to become more sustainable and better prepared for a changing climate. UfN partner organisations including Nottingham Universities Hospitals Trust and Nottingham College have signed up to the programme and helped the East Midlands to achieve its recruitment targets ahead of schedule.

As part of the programme, eleven students from the University of Nottingham and Nottingham Trent University have been trained as Climate Ambassadors to help primary schools in Nottingham City. The Climate Ambassadors are working with teachers and students to spark ideas for their climate action plans. A key part of the scheme is giving young people the chance to take ownership of their actions.

# Big boost for green chemistry research in Nottingham

A new £12 million grant will fund the Centre for Doctoral Training (CDT) in Resilient Chemistry in Nottingham, supporting groundbreaking research into sustainable chemical manufacturing.

Based across Nottingham's two universities, the CDT will train over 50 postgraduate students to develop greener processes for industries including pharmaceuticals, fragrances, adhesives, and lubricants. The focus is on creating environmentally friendly, circular manufacturing methods that reduce waste and carbon emissions.

This investment aligns with the Universities for Nottingham's mission to drive carbon-neutral innovation, boost local economic productivity, and turn zero-carbon research into real-world solutions.

The funding is part of a national push to support vital research tackling global sustainability challenges.

# Student donations ease pressure on local waste services

An annual campaign helping students donate unwanted items is not only supporting charity but also reducing strain on Nottingham's waste collection services.

The **#PackforGood** initiative, run by the British Heart Foundation (BHF) in partnership with Nottingham's universities, the City Council, and student accommodation providers, encourages students to donate preloved clothes, furniture, and electrical goods instead of discarding them when they leave their accommodation.

In 2023/2024 alone, students have donated **25,831 bags of items,** worth an estimated **£405,065**, helping to fund lifesaving research. The scheme has also **prevented 206,648 kg of waste from going to landfill,** easing the burden on local waste services.

By making it easier for students to recycle and reuse, #PackforGood is driving sustainability, supporting vital research, and keeping Nottingham's streets cleaner. Donations encouraged

# Our universities driving sustainability for the city

Nottingham's two universities are setting the standard for sustainability, earning global recognition for their environmental and social impact. NTU has been ranked the second most sustainable university in the world (UI GreenMetric) for the second year running and has held a first-class rating in the People and Planet University League for over a decade. Meanwhile, UoN is ranked 8th globally for sustainability and is actively reducing its carbon footprint. UoN's commitment spans carbon reduction, biodiversity conservation, and sustainable food initiatives, reinforcing its leadership in tackling climate change locally as well as globally.

These efforts bolster Nottingham's ambition to become the UK's first carbon-neutral city by 2028, create green jobs, and improve public spaces. By embedding sustainability


into education, research, and infrastructure, both universities are driving real change—ensuring a cleaner, healthier future for Nottingham and its people.





# Key partner contributions to CN28

- 30% of Nottingham City Council's vehicle fleet has been converted to ultra-low emission vehicles (ULEV).
- 45,000 new trees have been planted in the city.
- 15 buildings at Nottingham Trent University installing solar panels, 8 using biomass (for heating), and 8 are connected to the city's low carbon District Heating Network.
- Nottingham University Hospitals NHS Trust opened a new cycling facility at the City Hospital with space for 120 bikes, which is anticipated to reduce staff travel.

# Nottingham's universities unite to drive health innovation

Nottingham's universities and healthcare partners are working together to build on the city's renowned history of medical breakthroughs and put Nottinghamshire's cutting-edge healthcare technology on the map.

Over 91,000 people are employed in life sciences across Nottingham, making it a thriving centre for medical devices, biotechnology, and healthcare innovation.

UfN collaborations have secured nearly £10m to deliver three major health innovation programmes in Nottingham over the next five years:

EMERGE project: Funded by UKRI EPSRC, EMERGE (East Midlands Emerging RehabTech Growth Enterprise) will connect regional MedTech businesses with healthcare professionals, researchers, and the public to develop pioneering rehabilitation technologies — aiming to establish the East Midlands as the UK's 'RehabTech Valley'. Led by NTU in partnership with the University of Nottingham and regional partners.


■ Two NIHR HealthTech Research Centres: Focused on Rehabilitation and Mental Health, these centres will work with businesses to develop medical devices, diagnostics, and digital solutions to improve health and wellbeing. Nottingham is one of just a few cities nationally chosen to host two centres, reflecting its strength in innovation.

By combining their strengths, Nottingham's universities and healthcare partners are reinforcing the city as a centre of excellence in MedTech, attracting investment, creating local jobs, and generating new opportunities in healthcare innovation. This collaboration promises to benefit not only the region's economy but also improve healthcare outcomes for patients both locally and nationally.

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# Healthy Communities: building a food-secure Nottingham

The Nottingham City Sustainable Food Partnership is working to create a food-secure, resilient Nottingham. Bringing together public, private, community and university partners, it takes a whole-system approach to tackle food insecurity and create a sustainable local food system, ultimately supporting the health and well-being of Nottingham's communities.

Since 2022, civic and research teams from Nottingham Trent University and the University of Nottingham have led projects that have:

- Mapped local food security.
- Identified how people engage with food support.
- Linked food security to nutrition and health.
- Developed a roadmap for local food procurement.
- Identified training opportunities in urban agriculture.

Aligned with the City Council's Health and Wellbeing Strategy, the partnership works to promote sustainable food systems, expand access to nutritious food, and support community-based initiatives.

University partners lead five key workstreams:

- Food security
- Local food growing
- Local procurement (in collaboration with the County Council)
- Youth engagement in growing and healthy eating
- Promoting the region's food sector

Researchers have also contributed to the Nottinghamshire Joint Strategic Needs Assessment on Food Insecurity, offering valuable insights for local policy. Together, through ongoing research and action, the partnership is building a more inclusive, resilient food system for Nottingham. "38% of adults

### Students making a difference in health and social care

NTU and the City Council have developed an innovative approach to supporting the adult health and social care workforce needs across the city and county. The opportunity was collectively developed for students to undertake part-time work in this sector alongside their studies, but to also give back to the communities they often live within.

#### Initiative highlights:

- CareConnect event: Led by NTU's Uni-temps team, this event included a presentation by 'Skills for Care' on the 'soft skills' required for a job in this area, and networking with employers.
- Part-Time Jobs Fair: Over 2,000 students attended, exploring part-time job opportunities in the health and social care sector.

# Strengthening partnerships for the East Midlands' future

The UfN Civic Agreement provides a framework for partners to collaborate on key local priorities and champion our communities. This shared commitment has strengthened relationships between organisations, enhancing our ability to work together effectively.

Our collaboration has fostered a positive environment for the formation of the East Midlands Mayoral Combined County Authority (EMCCA). EMCCA will oversee economic development, regeneration, adult education and skills, transport, and housing, ensuring long-term regional growth.

In addition to supporting the partnership working necessary for EMCCA to flourish, the universities have worked together on:

- The creation of the East Midlands Investment Zone (EMIZ), a designated hub for green industries and advanced manufacturing. EMIZ offers business rates retention and tax reliefs to attract investment, drive innovation, and create high-quality jobs.
- The UfN Expert Advisory Panel (EAP), which provides evidence-based, cross-disciplinary insights to local leaders. Since its launch in 2022, the panel has addressed key challenges, including post-pandemic recovery, health and care demand, and resilience strategies to help inform local policymaking.

The strong foundations built through the UfN partnership will continue to play a vital role in supporting EMCCA's success and long-term impact.

### New initiative to boost Nottingham's creative and digital sector

A new partnership is set to drive growth in Nottingham's creative and digital industries (CDIs), helping local businesses overcome challenges and attract investment.

The **Nottingham Creative and Digital Industries Initiative**—a collaboration between Nottingham Trent University, the University of Nottingham, and Nottingham City Council—aims to understand the needs of CDIs, remove barriers to growth, and advocate for further support.

Through research with 125 local businesses, the initiative has identified key challenges, including the impact of the pandemic, inflation, and rising costs. This insight will help shape policies that support the sector.

Building on these findings, the **Create Growth N2** programme will provide creative tech (CreaTech) businesses with access to private investment and expert advice to help them scale up. This initiative strengthens Nottingham's position as a thriving hub for creative and digital industries.



## City as Lab: Digital and data innovation for Nottingham's future

City as Lab is transforming Nottingham into a hub of data-driven innovation using award-winning mapping tools to tackle real-world challenges. It brings together researchers, communities and local partners to collaborate in place-led problemsolving, policy and planning — testing new ideas to improve daily life.

City as Lab projects connect health, economic, social, education, and environmental data to help create smarter policies, better public services, and a more sustainable city. By visualising local

residents can make informed decisions about issues that matter to them.

Supporting this work is the new Nottingham Urban Room, a welcoming space where people can learn about the city's past, present, and future, and have a say in shaping it. Through events co-hosted with Nottingham City Council and Universities for Nottingham, communities can access the space and influence thinking and change.

## BBC Concert Orchestra partnership brings worldclass music to Nottingham

A groundbreaking partnership between the BBC Concert Orchestra and Universities for Nottingham is meeting our commitment to support and amplify the development of Nottinghamshire's cultural landscape. Launched in 2023, the three-year collaboration gives the area unique access to one of the UK's top broadcast orchestras, opening doors to music education, composition, and production.

The initiative aims to reach currently underserved communities through education programmes, workshops, performances and national projects like the BBC Young Composer Awards. Large-scale performances have attracted large audiences and served as a showcase for regional talent, while planned research collaborations are aiming to explore music's social impact and create innovative audience experiences.

By blending music, education, and research, this collaboration will grow and inspire the next generation of those working in the music industry and strengthen Nottinghamshire's creative scene.
