Chilwell Olympia Sports Centre

pitches, alongside soccer and rugby pitches, cricket squares and a large skateboarding facility.



Places of Interest

With its thriving and busy town centre, surrounded by interesting areas of open space and countryside, there is something for everyone in Beeston from Shopping to the Arts, and from Sports & Outdoor Recreation to History & Heritage. Listed below are just a number of places of interest and activity in Beeston and surrounding area, that are well worth a visit!

Outdoor Recreation

Attenborough Nature Reserve

Located alongside the River Trent, Attenborough Nature Reserve is an area of great ornithological and botanical interest, attracting a variety of birds, waterfowl and



wildlife including kingfishers, newts and stoats. The reserve is also a popular attraction for sailing, watersports, horse riding, fishing and walking.

Beeston Lock

Beeston Lock and Weir are no longer commercially used but together with the canal into Nottingham the area is a flourishing backwater for canal enthusiasts and a focal point for outdoor recreation.

Bramcote Hills Park

Bramcote Hills Park is the largest park in Broxtowe with nearly 80 acres of attractive wood and parkland. It boasts a children's play area, woodland walks, cricket pitch and pavilion, trim trail, picnic area and car park, alongside the historic Bramcote Park Walled Garden associated with the now demolished Bramcote Hall. The Walled Garden also includes the Holocaust Memorial – a sculpture by Holocaust survivor and artist Naomi Blake to commemorate National Holocaust Day.

Shopping

With a wide variety of retailers, from national names to a unique range of independent local shops, Beeston caters for all shopping requirements. History & Heritage

Manor House

Probably the oldest building in Beeston, the Manor House was built in the mid 16th century when Nicholas Streys III and his son John rebuilt the property. An east wing was later added in the 18th century.



The Parish Church of St John the Baptist

The Parish Church was substantially rebuilt in 1843 by Gilbert Scott on the site of earlier churches. Inside remnants of the earlier churches remain, notably a font from about 1230. The churchyard also contains a Crimean War Memorial and the former plague hole, which the parish records reveal was used to bury 138 bubonic plague victims.
