Academic considerations

- What is your current academic average or what do you think you will achieve?
 - An opportunity to study abroad for students not achieving a 2:1 or above
 - Not competitive
 - Don't miss out on the modules you would have taken at UNUK
 - Potential to take some regionally focused modules
- 60% minimum academic average required for International Exchanges
 - 65% minimum academic average required to apply for Australian & New Zealand partners
 - Intercampus minimum requirements vary but usually lower than International Exchange

Student Support

Racially minoritised students

We recognise that our community of students is diverse and that students will have a range of experiences during their time abroad.

It is important to acknowledge that protected characteristics can play a part in how students are able to engage with and experience their exchange - from regional situational safety to differences in legal protections.

Consider

- How will aspects of my identity be perceived abroad?
- Are there cultural norms and/or laws that could affect my safety abroad
- Behaviour and language that is considered acceptable may be very different to what you are used to
- What access is there to haircare/skin care/beauty products in the countries you are considering
- Freedom to practice religion?



Student Support

LGBTQ+

Laws, legal rights/protections and social attitudes are not the same around the world.

Consider

- Laws & social attitudes in the countries you are considering
- Attitudes towards presenting a gender that is perceived as different to that on your passport
- Customs laws with regards to importing hormones into another country
- Is it safe to be out in that country
- Are there LGBTQ+ societies or support at the destination - use the links on the partner profiles



Malaysia



Campus location and local travel

- UNM based in town of Semenyih
- Range of restaurants and shops
- 45 minutes from Kuala Lumpur by taxi: approx. £15
- 1hr20 from the airport: approx. £12
- Free shuttle bus from Semenyih to Kajang, 45 mins train to KL: 76p each way
- Bus from Semenyih to KL: 53p
- Taxi from campus to Kajang: £5.35





Regional travel

Malaysia is well-located for travel around Southeast Asia:

- 1 hour flight or 6-hour bus to Singapore
- 2-hour flight to Borneo
- 2-hour flight to Cambodia
- 2-hour flight to Vietnam
- 2-hour flight to Thailand
- 3-hour flight to Bali, Indonesia





Travel restrictions

- Students must not arrange travel within or outside of Malaysia at the beginning or end of the study period
- Students are required to submit their passport to the Visa Office at UNM at the start and end of the exchange for immigration purposes
- Students are only permitted to travel to their home country after the exchange and are required to show a departure flight confirmation to the UNM Visa Office
- If you do not show proof that you're returning to your home country, you will be prevented from boarding your flight



Kuala Lumpur

- Capital city: 1.8 million people
- Petronas Towers with public skybridge and observation deck
- Golden Triangle district famous for nightlife: bars, clubs and restaurants
- British Colonial-era landmarks: the Kuala Lumpur Railway Station and the Sultan Abdul Samad Building
- Batu Caves





Campus life

- University accommodation in residential non-catered halls on campus
- UniVillage private accommodation close to campus
- Air-conditioning or fans





Accommodation

- Wide range of food available incl. Thai, Western, Japanese and Indian
- Shops incl. mobile phone and two convenience stores
- Free sports facilities including outdoor pool and running route
- Student association building – 70 societies
- Health Service
- Library





China



Campus location and local travel

- City campus – 30 minutes from city centre by bus
- Ningbo Lishe International Airport, 30 minutes' drive from campus, connects Ningbo by air to the rest of China, with regularly scheduled flights.
- China's capital city Beijing is a two-hour flight from Ningbo.
- Shanghai is 30 minutes by plane, a three-hour bus journey via the 36km Hangzhou Bay Bridge, or 2 hours via high-speed train.
- Hangzhou, capital of Zhejiang Province, is two hours' drive. One of the more modern and prosperous cities in China and one of China's seven ancient national capitals.





Regional travel

China is well-located for travel around East and Southeast Asia:

- 2-hour flight from Beijing/Shanghai to Seoul, South Korea
- 2-hour flight from Guangzhou to Hanoi, Vietnam
- 2.5 hour flight from Shenzhen to Manila, Philippines
- 3-hour flight from Guangzhou to Phnom Penh, Cambodia
- 3-hour flight from Beijing to Tokyo, Japan





Ningbo city

- Approx. 8 million inhabitants
- Ningbo is a port city with a rich cultural heritage
- One of the greenest & least polluted cities in China
- A lively nightlife scene of bars and clubs, as well as theatre, art, music, comedy and cinema
- Tianyi Library – one of the oldest in the world
- Ningbo Wulong Pond
- Tiantong Temple
- Nantang Old Street
- Ningbo Zoo





Campus life

- Free sports facilities including cycling studio, climbing walls, bouldering walls and 16 station table tennis
- Nearly 100 student organisations and societies – events include Global Village, Colour run and Chinese Lantern making
- High Street: supermarket, variety of restaurants including KFC, Pizza Hut, Luckin Coffee, hair & beauty salon, bookstore, post office and more
- Life skills training such as baking, cooking, small repairs, and tea art are organized in the form of workshops and salons.
- Cultural activities: Spring Festival, Mid-Autumn Festival and Dragon Boat Festival
- Health and Wellbeing clinic on campus with 24 hour medical care, and a private hospital nearby including emergency department
- Student Support teams offering ongoing support





Accommodation

- International Residence Building 11: single occupancy with private shower room and toilet
- International Residence Building 18/20: four room flat with shared lounge, shower room, washroom and a balcony
- All rooms fully furnished, equipped with air conditioning, and Wi-Fi, as well as bread baker and rice cooker
- Warden, Deputy Warden and tutors on site

Accommodation costs

- China: £570 - £1,404 per semester
- Malaysia: £400 - £900 per semester

Cost of living in China and Malaysia is generally cheaper than the UK

Visa costs

China: £150 + £42 residence permit

Malaysia: £640

Plus costs to travel to embassies/consulates

Vaccinations

£0 to £300+



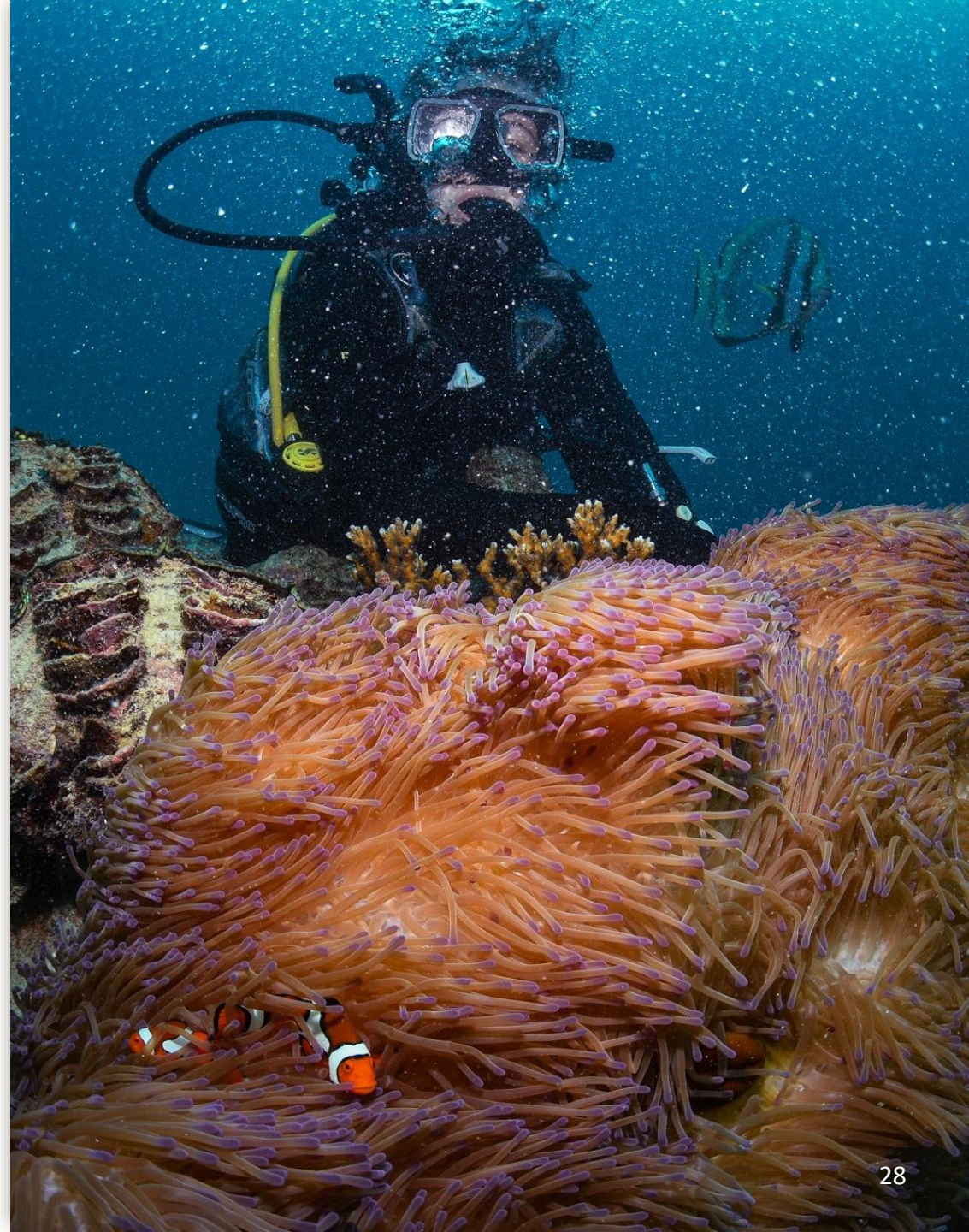
Budgeting

Tuition fees and loans

- Reduced tuition fees:
 - Home full year: £1,430
 - International full year: 50% discount
 - Home semester: £6,675
 - International semester: 25% discount
- Overseas rate of loan

Scholarships and Bursaries

- Student Finance travel grant
- £750 Intercampus automatic bursary
- Potential for additional means-tested bursary
- Eligible for Turing funding, subject to availability
