

THE SAROD

The sarod is among the youngest mainstream melodic instruments of classical Hindustani music. Based on the Kabuli rabāb, an Afghan instrument brought to India in the fifteenth century, it was first designed by Ustad Niamatullah Khan (1827-1903) of the Lucknow gharānā in the Awadh court of Nawab Wajid Ali Shah. The sarod is known for its deep, absorbing tone and its distinctly modern sound. It has a hollow wooden body, commonly carved from Indian teak or tun wood. The hollow chamber, covered with stretched goatskin membrane, acts as the resonator. The tapering neck is fitted with a fretless, steel or iron plate. All the strings are metallic and include four main playing strings, two chikārī strings, and several sympathetic strings. It is played using a coconut shell plectrum, while the strings are pressed using the musician's nails to achieve its characteristic rich sound.

THE MAESTROS

Arnab Chakrabarty started training in Hindustani classical music at the age of 7. A leading scion of the Lucknow and Shahjahanpur *gharānās* of the Sarod, he has trained under erudite luminaries of the twentieth century, including Dr Kalyan Mukherjea, Ustad Irfan Muhammad Khan, & Pt Buddhadev Dasgupta. He has also learnt Hindustani vocal music under Pt Yeshwantbuwa Joshi of the Gwalior *gharānā*. In his music, Arnab imbibes elements from all his gurus, subtly synthesising them into a style uniquely his own, enriched by his unusually large repertoire and fecund imagination. In a career spanning more than 25 years, he has performed in over 35 countries. He is also a sought-after sarod guru and music writer, renowned for his thoroughly researched pieces on music history. He has won major recording and touring grants from the Toronto Arts Council and the Canada Council for the Arts. In 2023, he received the prestigious Chalmers Fellowship from the Ontario Arts Council.

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Shahbaz Hussain began learning the tablā at 5 with his father Ustad Mumtaz Hussain. He went on to study with tabla legends like Ustad Faiyaz Khan of the Delhi gharānā, and Ustad Shaukat Hussain Khan & Ustad Allah Rakha Khan of the Punjab gharānā. Shahbaz is among the leading tabla maestros of the world today, equally at ease with traditional repertoires as well as contemporary styles. He is as renowned for his accompaniment skills as he is for his virtuosic solo recitals. His band, Indus, has received critical acclaim for their debut album Firefly. Shahbaz is also a passionate and dedicated teacher and has already trained some fine young musicians. He regularly teaches across the country, including at the University of Newcastle and the University of Huddersfield.
