During the day, students will engage in university-style talks, reinforcing and strengthening their understanding of essential themes in the Religious Studies A Level. Comprehensive slides accompany each talk - the day is totally designed to add academic acclaim to any essay.

SPEAKERS



Professor Fiona Ellis' work is at the intersection of philosophy and theology and her areas of research expertise include the philosophy and theology of desire, the philosophy and theology of nature, the nature of spirituality, and the question of life's meaning. She has a particular interest in figures like Nietzsche, Schopenhauer, Hegel, Heidegger, and Spinoza.



Dr Tim Hutchings is interested in the relationship between religion, media and culture, with particular attention to digital forms of Christianity. His research has included studies of online worship; digital evangelism and formation; online community; digital publishing and e-reading; apps and games; and death and dying.



Dr lan James Kidd's research explores Buddhism, illness, misanthropy, classical Chinese philosophy, and moral and intellectual virtues and vices. They also have broader interests in aesthetics, ethics, philosophy of education, and the history of Western philosophy



Professor Neil Sinclair's research focuses on meta-ethics, particularly the nature and status of moral judgments, with a central interest in expressivism—the view that moral judgments express emotions aimed at influencing others.



Professor Andrew Fisher's research explores the philosophy of education, with a focus on the transformative role of education in raising aspirations. Their commitment to teaching extends beyond the university, including engagement with the community through philosophy education in local primary schools.



Dr Michael Burdett's research spans philosophical theology, with expertise in both continental and analytic philosophy of religion. Specializing in theological anthropology and eschatology, they also engage with religion and science—particularly Science and Technology Studies and evolution —as well as Christian ethics, and the intersection of religion and culture.



Professor Jon Hoover's research focuses on Islamic theology and philosophy, exploring foundational questions about religious knowledge, divine attributes, human freedom, and prophecy. They also examine Muslim ethical and theological interactions with non-Muslims, as well as the integration of late antique philosophical traditions into Islamic thought.




Dr Patrice Haynes' research focuses on the philosophy of religion, with a particular interest in reconfiguring the field through engagement with West African religious thought and decolonial theory. Future work aims to develop the concept of "theological materialism," exploring how continental philosophy of religion can retrieve divine transcendence in a way that affirms embodied, worldly life.
