Clare Harvey, an alumna of the Creative Writing MA, recently won the Exeter Novel Prize for her first novel. But the University has traditionally afforded staff and students from all disciplines the opportunity to express their creativity through publication in magazines such as The Gong.



The collection begins with a poem by DH Lawrence, written when he was a student at University College Nottingham. Entitled 'Study', its subject is the hardship of revising in the library when one would rather be outdoors. He submitted it to the editor of the college magazine *The Gong* who turned it down. Nevertheless, his time at college was a prolific period for his writing, and his college notebooks contain drafts

of various poems that would go on to be published.
