Dear Children,



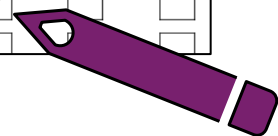
My name is Cath.

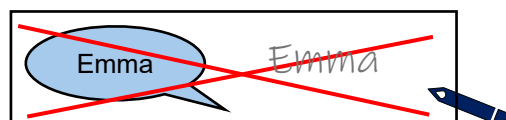
