Categories

The categories for the awards are:

• Rising Star Award - Policy Impact

This award will be presented to a member of staff in the early stages of an academic or research-only career who has worked with politicians, civil servants or any other type of policymakers or influencers with the aim of influencing public policy with their research findings.

Nominations for this category are open to early career research and academic staff, who have completed a doctorate within the last 8 years. Please note that the time limit may be flexible depending on individual circumstances – see the FAQs document for more details.

Rising Star Award – Public Engagement

This award will be presented to a member of staff in the early stages of an academic or research-only career who has engaged the public with their research to generate mutual benefit. Public engagement activity includes hosting public events, running patient and public involvement initiatives, citizen science and collaborative research projects.

Nominations are open to early career research and academic staff, who have completed a doctorate within the last 8 years. Please note that the time limit may be flexible depending on individual circumstances – see the FAQs document for more details.

• Best Policy Impact Initiative

This award recognises an individual or team for a successful activity or initiative where research findings and communications have influenced the formation or implementation of public policy. This may be through working with politicians, civil servants or any other type of policymakers or influencers at any geographical location.

Nominations are open to individual research or academic staff, or research groups.

Best Public Engagement Initiative

This award recognises an individual or team for a successful public engagement activity or initiative where public groups have benefitted from engagement with University of Nottingham research. Public engagement activity includes hosting public events, running patient and public involvement initiatives, citizen science and collaborative research projects.

Nominations are open to individual research or academic staff, or research groups.

Best School Engagement Initiative

This award recognises an individual or team for a successful public engagement activity or initiative involving pupils at school or college. The activity or programme can have taken place in the classroom, on campus or elsewhere. Pupils must have benefitted by being inspired by current research or by contributing to research.

This award will be made in collaboration with the Schools and Colleges Outreach team.

Nominations are open to individual research or academic staff, or research groups.

The Institute Director's Award (IDA)

This award recognises a non-academic member of staff, or non-academic team, who has been instrumental in supporting and facilitating the delivery of successful policy impact or public engagement work.

Nominations are open to members of staff outside of the Research & Teaching (R&T) job family.

Judging Criteria

Policy Impact - Rising Star and Best Initiative Awards

These awards recognise outstanding academic staff based on all campuses whose research findings and communications have influenced the formation or implementation of public policy. This may be through working with politicians, civil servants or any other type of policymakers or influencers at any geographical location.

We invite both self-nominations and nominations made by a member of staff at faculty or school level or by a professional services staff member. The Best Initiative award is open to all academic staff, while the Rising Star award is aimed at Early Career Researchers (please see the FAQs for more detail on eligibility).

Applications will be judged against the following criteria:

- Evidence that the research findings have been taken up and used by policymakers.
- Lasting/emerging relationships with policymakers who facilitated policy impact, or as a result of the policy impact achieved.
- Benefit to the faculty/school/department/institute from a strategic, financial and/or reputational point of view.

Public Engagement with Research - Rising Star, Best Public Engagement Initiative and Best School Engagement Initiative Awards

These awards recognise outstanding academic staff based on all campuses who are opening up research at UoN to the wider world through engagement with the public.

Public engagement is about sharing and involving others in our research to inspire people of all ages, gain insights and share tools to help make sense of a complex and changing world. Eligible activity includes co-ordinating after school clubs, patient and public involvement, citizen science and collaborative research projects.

We invite both self-nominations and nominations made by a member of staff at faculty or school level or by a professional services staff member. The Best Public Engagement

Initiative and Best School Engagement Initiative awards are open to all academic staff, while the Rising Star award is aimed at Early Career Researchers (please see the FAQs for more detail on eligibility).

Work that is primarily intended to recruit students to UoN or higher education more generally (such as traditional taster sessions), is not covered by these awards.

Applications will be judged against the following criteria:

- Innovation in approaches to engage public groups with UoN research
- Involvement of diverse public groups, particularly those whose voices are heard less
 often
- Evidence that the activities provided benefits to the public, the researchers and the University of Nottingham

The Institute Director's Award

This award recognises the indispensable work non-academic members of staff do to facilitate the work of our academics and researchers to engage the public with research and/or achieve policy impact.

We invite both self-nominations and nominations made by a member of staff at faculty or school level or by a professional services staff member.

Applications will be judged against the following criteria:

- Demonstrable ongoing commitment to support public engagement or policy impact activity
- Development and implementation of new ideas and approaches to engagement
- Establishing relationships with public or policy audiences
