Where is Ningbo?



- Shanghai is 2.5 hours drive south of UNNC
- 2nd tier city: 3.5 million in urban districts
- 7th busiest port in the world
- UNNC- 13th Year in Ningbo

Aims and Methods



- Pre-existing social, cultural and political structure versus new actors in a post disaster context
- Continuity and discontinuity of such structures and relations
- 3 years study of 20 barangays of comparable size across three adjacent coastal LGUs, Tacloban (8), Palo (6) and Tanauan (6)
- 100 interviews, 18 focus group discussions (FGDs) and 1600 surveys across our chosen barangays



Main questions- this workshop



- What are the important lessons from Yolanda?
- How can we engage with the different stakeholders for better rebuilding outcomes?
- How can government-led post disaster projects be peoplecentred, participatory, inclusive, transparent and accountable?



Main findings-

Capacity, capability and coordination

- Multiple level coordination
- Multiple actors/ stakeholders coordination
- Issues of transparency and equity
 - Aid distribution
 - Politics of Aid
 - Political dynasties versus humanitarian responses
- Questions of experienced leadershipknowledge and skills
- Monitoring and lessons learnt

- Political Ecology of disastersfurther marginalisation of underprivileged or under-represented groups through CCA/ CCM?
- Inclusive Human security-Freedom from fear and freedom from want
