On-Going Clinical Trials Update



Recruitment for the trials now stands at 71 for PATCH I and 80 for PATCH II. Due to the continued lower than anticipated recruitment rates we are currently in discussion with the funders to look at the best way forward for these trials. We will let you know as soon as any firm decisions have been reached.



The STOP GAP pilot study is now up and running with thirteen centres being involved in a case note review of pyoderma gangrenosum patients over the past three years. The next phase of the study, involving the use of digital images to monitor wound healing will begin shortly. Thank you to all the centres taking part for their efforts in this pilot study.



This HTA funded trial on bullous pemphigoid is now at set up stage. In order to recruit sufficient patients into the trial we will be working with colleagues in Europe to set up centres across Germany and the Netherlands. Increasing Our Links With Primary Care

We have been successful in our application to the Trent Research and Development Support Unit (RDSU) for a research capacity development award to increase and strengthen our links with the primary care community.

The aims of this one year project are to increase awareness of the Network amongst the primary care community, to increase membership from this area and to identify priorities for primary care dermatology trials. Part of the project will be a one day, free of charge, training workshop specifically in the field of dermatology clinical trials. Depending on the level of interest in this course from primary care, we may open it up to all our members. If you feel you may be interested, please get in touch.

Due to the funding source for this scheme of work, it will primarily be run as a pilot study within the Trent geographical region. The training course will however be open to any of our primary care members across the UK as most have shown an interest in attending.

NIHR Research Infrastructure: What Does it Mean for the UK DCTN?

Best Research for Best Health is the governments' R&D strategy to provide a world-class infrastructure for clinical trials in all areas of disease and clinical need within the NHS and will be delivered by the NIHR Clinical Research Network. This is comprised of a national co-ordinating centre, six topic specific research networks (cancer, stroke, dementia, diabetes, mental health and medicines for children), a primary care research network and a comprehensive clinical research network (CCRN) to cover all other areas, including dermatology.

The CCRN is a major component of the overall clinical research network and will provide the infrastructure for clinical research in the NHS in England through the allocation and management of NHS service support costs. The CCRN has been split into 25 Comprehensive Local Research Networks (CLRNs) within the boundaries of Strategic Health Authorities (SHA). Each CLRN has a host NHS organisation and is led by a Clinical Director supported by a Senior Manager. Each CLRN also has an Executive Group which works closely with the Clinical Director and Senior Manager and is responsible for developing operational plans and policies and ensuring the effective representation of all NHS sectors within that CLRN. The devolved nations are developing similar clinical research strategies.

The Clinical Research Network have just announced that they will be developing Speciality Groups within the CLRNs. There are 26 in total, with skin being one of them. Each CLRN will identify and nominate a Clinical Lead for that group, if interest in that area can be

identified locally. The Clinical Leads from each of these local groups will then constitute the National Speciality Group for that topic. Each Speciality Group will therefore vary in size depending on the number of CLRNs with an interest in that topic.

So, what does this mean for the UK DCTN? Firstly, the funding stream for the infrastructure of organisations such as ours has disappeared and we need to investigate how we fit in with the CLRN and other areas such as Clinical Trial Units (CTUs). This will enable us to identify where we can best obtain future funding so that we can continue the excellent work of the Network. Secondly, we need to ensure that the Executive Groups within each CLRN are aware of the UK DCTN and what we do, as we are unlikely to receive any funding if they are unaware of our activities. We have a drafted letter available ready to send to the Clinical Directors of all 25 CLRNs across England, and a very big thank you to those members who have already contacted their relevant CLRN. If you would like to send one of these letters then please do get in touch with the Network administrator Maggie McPhee for further details. If you, or any of your colleagues are involved in a CLRN Executive group please do let us know so that we can ensure we can provide you with any supporting information you may need. Again, a very big thank you to those members who have contacted us regarding this. We will of course keep you updated of any progress in this area, particularly with regard to the newly announced Speciality Groups.

Please do remember that this is YOUR Network and at this crucial time for clinical research in the NHS it's future is dependent on YOUR support.

Research Prioritisation Panel

At a recent UK DCTN Executive Committee meeting, it was realised that in order to maintain a degree of focus and momentum for our work and to develop a nationally agreed research strategy it would help the Network enormously to have a Research Prioritisation Panel.

The roles of the panel will cover areas such as:

- Identifying research gaps and priorities in dermatology from evidence sources such as Cochrane Systematic Reviews and from current clinical and policy debates.
- Using this information to recommend HTA vignettes to be written and developed.
- Appraising and then prioritising vignettes received by the UK DCTN before further development through the Steering Committee and co-ordinating centre.
- Making recommendations about which UK DCTN vignettes should be submitted to the HTA

Thank you to all who expressed an interest in joining the panel and we're delighted to announce that the independent chair of the panel will be Dr Ibrahim Nasr, a long standing member of the Steering Committee and member of our Executive Committee. We are lucky to have panel members with specialist interests in areas including paediatrics, skin cancer, laser therapy, vulval disease, acne and biostatistics. We are also pleased to have consumer representation on the panel.

If you missed the original call of interest and would like to become involved in the panel then please contact the Network Manager, Carron Layfield.

We are currently investigating how the panel will operate eg the formation of clinical studies groups and will keep you updated of its activities.
