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Trials update

1. Cellulitis pilot study (PATCH trial)



The cellulitis pilot study is almost complete. We had a total of 18 recruiting centres and successfully enrolled 66 participants between November 2004 and March 2005. The results of this pilot study will be used to inform the design of an RCT looking at the use of prophylactic antibiotics for the prevention of recurrent cellulitis.

An application has recently been submitted to Action Medical Research for funding for the main RCT. A decision is expected in July 2005.

2. STOP-GAP trial

Study of topical and oral treatments for the treatment of pyoderma gangrenosum patients.

This proposal is now well developed and is currently available for peer review. If you would be willing to comment on the proposal, please contact Phillippa Scott (contact details overleaf).

We are still looking for recruiting centres for this study. If you would be willing to help and have not yet registered an interest in this trial, please contact Phillippa, who will add your details to the list of potential recruiting centres.

It is anticipated that an application for funding will be submitted to the British Skin Foundation in September 2005.

New trial suggestions

Two new trial suggestions have been accepted by the network over the last few months. These are currently being developed into outline proposals:

- Moh's versus standard excisional surgery for cutaneous SCC – proposed by Colin Fleming & Cliff Lawrence
- Oxytetracycline versus prednisolone for the treatment of bullous pemphigoid – proposed by Fenella Wojnarowska

Light at the end of the tunnel – regulatory approvals

The increasing legislation around the conduct of clinical trials means that regulatory approvals are now a key issue when conducting multi-centre research. Those of you who helped with the PATCH pilot study will know that it is often the R&D approval process that is the most time consuming. This has largely been due to the different application forms and requirements required by Trusts throughout the country. However, things are hopefully set to improve with the launch of a standardised national on-line application form for R&D approval. The new form was launched on 31st March, 2005, and can be accessed from: http://www.rdform.org.uk. This site is linked to the existing COREC form website and allows you to use the same log in details for both.

I am hopeful that the approval process for future trials will be considerably improved by this development.
