## **CEBD** related news and updates

- A <u>blog</u> about the CEBD Patient Panel and review of activities against the National Standards for Patient Involvement in research has now been published on the CEBD website— please do take 5 minutes to read it and many thanks indeed to all involved in putting this together.
- An outline application has been submitted to the <u>National Institute for Health Research</u> (NIHR) programme grant scheme for the RAPID eczema project. This programme grant on mild to moderate eczema has workstreams including efficient online trials in the NHS, an online platform to allow patient led trials and implementation and process evaluation including work with seldom heard groups. We are really grateful for all the support we've had from panel members in helping to develop this project and panel member Amanda Roberts is a co-applicant on the application.
- We also continue to be busy at the <u>UK DCTN</u> with another outline application submitted to the National Institute for Health Research (NIHR) for the SCC-AFTER study which is investigating the role of adjuvant radiotherapy in high-risk squamous cell carcinoma patients, with panel member Pat Fairbrother involved. Sadly, the outline application for the COUNT study investigating the use of nicotinamide to prevent skin cancer was unsuccessful.
- CEBD Co-director Hywel Williams has now completed his term of office as Director of the NIHR Health
  Technology Assessment programme. Please see his <u>final directors message</u> as he reflects back on his five
  years in this post.
- The application for the ATHENA shingles study (previously known as ZAP) led by CEBD collaborator Matt Ridd in Bristol has been successful. This study, which will investigate the use of pain relief to prevent neuralgia in shingles, is at very early set-up stages and should be recruiting it's first patients in about 18 months time. Many thanks to those panel members who contributed to the development of this project last June by responding to surveys and sharing their experiences.
- A <u>podcast</u> is now available for the blistering skin disease bullous pemphigoid project that was highlighted in the last newsletter.



# Panel member Peter Smart appointed as Cochrane Skin's first patient editor

# I have a dragon who lives in my skin....

At the annual CEBD Patient Panel event last year, Stephanie Lax and Fiona Cowdell shared an idea for an educational outreach project with a potential collaboration between CEBD and local professional orchestra Sinfonia Viva. Taking into account the views of the panel, and in subsequent creative discussions with Viva, the central focus has shifted to creatively sharing key points from Fiona's NIHR Knowledge Mobilisation fellowship about eczema with a Key Stage 1 audience (children age 5-7), and will be funded as part of that project.

We are excited to say that the development and delivery of this will now be digital; whilst this has become a necessity due to the COVID-19 pandemic, it will enable a geographically much broader reach for the project activities.

At the present time, Hazel Gould (writer and theatre director) and Jay Nolan-Latchford (illustrator) are developing a storyline and visuals to use in a series of online workshops for children who have eczema. Hazel and a music workshop leader will work with young people and their families to record parts of the story and create musical material for a digital performance accompanied by an 8-piece ensemble from Sinfonia Viva. Outcomes will be a book and recording created for, and by, children with eczema, which can then be shared widely online and in educational settings.
