#### **The Basic Idea**

#### A SERVICE TEMPLATE

Establish evidence-based key ingredients of proper social support services for people with dementia (PWD) at home, and their carers, providing a template for proper services

#### **DEVELOP SERVICE FIDELITY TOOL**

Develop a 'Fidelity Index' (FI) tool to check how faithfully services fro PWD match this template, in the real world of 30 English home support services, working with their service managers and services self-auditing their services, exploring with them how they make these assessments and their evidence.

#### **DEVELOPING SERVICE TEMPLATE - METHODOLOGY**

Substantial thematic literature search of the evidence base, analysis of English Government guidance and regulatory approaches, consulting with experts, professionals and service users, followed by an iterative process with our expert advisory group to achieve consensus

#### The Literature Reviews

Initially based upon a number of search terms (for example: 'dementia', 'home' support', 'domiciliary support' and 'care') applied to ASSIA, Cochrane Central Register of Controlled Trials, EMBASE, MEDLINE, Social Care Online, PsycINFO, National Research Register Projects Database, OT Seeker

Additional outsourced 10 yrs search of all world literature in English

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Template Theme	Application to front line services
A. Commissioning (dementia specific service)	The person who 'buys' the service largely dictates how the service will perform: do they buy a series of tasks, or a service designed to support the whole person?
B. Integration, co-ordination and care management	Do services work together in the best interests of their client?
C. Person and relationship centred care	Is the service task centred (clean the house, make the tea) or relationship centred (help the person to socialise by working with them)?
D. Continuity of care	Does the service allow the client to form a meaningful working relationship with their care team?
E. Support for carers	The client's principal carer is a key person in keeping the client out of institutional care – they need support in order to do this.
F. Care planning	Care does not just happen, it needs to be planned and co- ordinated.
G. Training	Care workers are not born with the skills, knowledge and abilities that they need to care for people with dementia, they must be suitably trained.
H. Support for staff	Caring for people with dementia can be stressful, care workers therefore need support and supervision to ensure that they work effectively.
I. Flexible and responsive services	Services must be able to respond to the changing needs of their clients.
J. Organisational factors (Policies, procedures, processes, systems and culture)	Services for people with dementia don't just happen, they must be planned and organised effectively.
