It develops previous themes and also presents evidence for the sheer diversity of medieval landscapes within the study area and the range of sources available to reconstruct them. Spencer Gavin Smith is a Project Officer with the Gwynedd Archaeological Trust and a former Investigator with the Royal Commission on the Ancient and Historic Monuments of Wales. He is currently completing his PhD thesis part time at Manchester Metropolitan University.

Dwelling in Neolithic Orkney:

the domestic architecture of the 4th and 3rd millennium BC

and the implications of new discoveries.

Giles Carev

The archaeology of Orkney is justifiably envied across Britain – the image of the henges and stone circles at Brodgar and Stenness or the midden-encased settlement at Skara Brae have long captivated the imagination of locals and visitors alike. While these substantial remains form a focus for archaeological attention, it has in effect, sidelined attention away from the diversity of settlement and ritual practice happening across the archipelago in the Neolithic. This talk will draw upon a number of recent discoveries with which the speaker has been involved, to explore this diverse settlement record and how it sets the scene for later Neolithic occupation. Giles Carey is currently Archaeological Technician, for Shropshire Council, dealing mainly with the Historic Environment Record.

LiDAR—the landscape in a different light

Professor Stewart Ainsworth

LiDAR, Light Detection and Ranging, is a remote sensing technology that uses a pulsed laser beam to measure ranges (variable distances) to the Earth. It provides highly detailed and accurate models of the land surface and provides archaeologists with the capability to recognise and record otherwise hard to detect features. Professor Stewart Ainsworth of the University of Chester will be exploring how LiDAR can unlock secrets in the landscape, with particular reference to the Stiperstones and Corndon Hills area.

Living with Water: Past, Present, Future:

Medieval water management on the Severn and elsewhere.

Dr Richard Jones

Early medieval place-names contain a wealth of environmental information, much of it designed to signal the local presence, characteristics and behaviour of water. Taking a landscape archaeological approach and drawing on the Traditional Ecological Knowledge paradigm, this paper explores what these names tell us about water consciousness in the past. How did people understand water? What measures were taken to control water? In short, how did people live successfully at the water's edge? The paper then asks whether these names can now be marshalled to address the contemporary issue of flooding after a millennium of redundancy. Dr Richard Jones is Senior Lecturer in Landscape History in the Centre for English Local History at the University of Leicester.

Saturday 9th April 2016 Battlefield archaeology

Over the last two decades battlefield archaeology has become a recognised area of research in the UK and, more recently, across Europe. Using major studies like Bosworth (1485), Edgehill (1642), Pinkie (1547) and Oudenaarde (1708), but also considering some local sites like Moreton Corbett and Mortimer's Cross, the lecture will explore the methods used and how they can advance understanding of individual events and of warfare more generally. Dr Glenn Foard is Reader in Battlefield Archaeology at the University of Huddersfield.
