What is the Family Discovery Day?

The Family Discovery Day is a free, fun event for the whole family. Primary school pupils and their families can take part in a range of hands-on drop-in activities, on a range of different topics. Subject areas will cover: Arts and Humanities, Medicine and Health, Science and Nature, Maths and Engineering. We will also deliver a session in your school before your visit where all family members can take part in engaging activities to learn about university life and explore future aspirations.

The aims and objectives of this programme are:

- To increase awareness and understanding of higher education for parent/carers and their children
- To engage families in learning new things and enjoying time together as a family
- To raise aspirations for the future amongst both adults and their children

When is the Family Discovery Day?

- **Visit to the University - Saturday 18th June 2022** - your school will be invited, along with four other schools, to either the morning or afternoon session lasting 2 to 2.5 hours.
- **In school session** - our team will deliver a 1-hour aspiration and introduction to university session in your school in either May or early June. The pre visit is 1 hour and will include hands on games and activities about university and future hopes and dreams.

Who and how many people can we bring?

Families can include all family members: parents/carers, younger and older siblings etc. You can bring a maximum of 50 family members from your school.

How do we get to the University?

As a school you would organise group transport for your families – usually a coach to travel together on. You can claim a travel bursary of up to 50% of the cost of your transport
